Blessed Gérard's Care Centre and Hospice proves more and more to be the right project at the right time in the right area.

Reading the AIDS statistics of our days for our area is like a horror movie and there are still many who deny the facts, because they think this is the way to prevent panic.

- Six million South Africans will be infected with HIV by the year 2005.
- Most of them will come from kwaZulu/Natal.
- In the same year the number of people in the country living with fullblown AIDS will have reached a staggering 1,5 million.
- The HIV infection rate in kwaZulu/Natal is at 26,6 % (according to the National Department of Health).
- The national infection average is 16 % (according to the latest national HIV antenatal survey).
- Last year's figure was 14 %
- Already 150000 people have died from AIDS in kwaZulu/Natal in the past seven years.
- It will only take another two years for that figure to double.

- Research has shown that by the year 2014, when AIDS mortality is at its peak, 130000 people will be dying each year.
- Last year alone AIDS killed more people in the province than all other causes together.
- By 2006 the cumulative total of AIDS deaths in kwaZulu/Natal will have surpassed one million.
- And by 2016 the number will reach two million in absence of a cure.
- South Africa has grown from having one of the lowest infection rates a few years ago to currently having the fastest growing epidemic on the continent (according to Dr. Garth Japhet).
- It is estimated that between 40 and 50 million people globally will have the HIV virus by the year 2000.

- AIDS-tests at Empangeni (80 km from Mandeni) show, that 45% of the patients tested are HIV positive
- Sundumbili Clinic tested 60 % HIV positive in 1998
- An industrial nurse at a big factory in iSithebe estimated that 80 % of their employees are HIV positive and
- A nurse at Stanger Hospital told us, that she thinks, that 100% of the patients in her ward are HIV-positive.

We cannot prove these statistics or estimates right or wrong and we do not mention them to show off with our disaster. We also do not know why our area is considered the worst in South Africa as far as HIV infection is concerned.

When we planned and built Blessed Gérard's Care Centre and Hospice in Mandeni, we certainly were not aware of the real extent of these developments. Our main aim was to assist the many patients with all kinds of diseases who are not sufficiently cared for by their families. Now, as we are up and running for nearly two years we realise more and more, that we have just done the right thing, at the right time, in the right area. Call it a lucky coincidence or divine providence: The AIDS wave is hitting with vengeance and we are ready and prepared with our staff and volunteers, in a very functional and well equipped building, to help those, who would otherwise suffer from neglect on top of AIDS. It is our shocking experience that many families just want to get rid of their relative suffering from full-blown AIDS. This is a total contradiction to the good old tradition in Zulu society, that sick family members are normally looked after quite well. We found that it is mostly fear and lack of knowledge how to handle an AIDS patient without running the risk of getting infected oneself. Our home nursing care is therefore combined with counselling of the family members, teaching them where and how to be cautious and where there is no danger, so that they can care for their relative without fear and resentment.

AIDS and traditional healers

Another area of concern is, that most of the Zulu in our area will trust rather in their traditional healers than in modern medicine. This would not be a problem, if they would just be given herbal substances, which would at least make them feel better subjectively. But if the medicine-man makes multiple incisions with a razor blade in the skin of an HIV positive person, to rub "medicine" into the wounds (which is a very widely spread "treatment") and uses the same razor blade in the same way for the next patient, the "cure" of the one becomes the lethal side-effect for the next.

A further complication is that about half the AIDS patients have Tuberculosis of the lungs, but many refuse to take the appropriate medication, for lack of understanding, that this is indespensable to inactivate TB.

Other people's care is jeopardised by the traditional belief that inducing vomitting would "clean the system" and thus any oral medicine given by professionals is rendered useless by this practice.

Yet another difficulty in our care giving is the attitude of many people, who fear death and the inability to witness and cope with suffering and therefore ostracize their dying relative.

Far worse is the widespread rumour an HIV positive patient could rid himself from the deadly virus through having intercourse with a young virgin. Countless rapes of girls from as young as 3 years upwards are the sad consequence. Words cannot describe the horror for these children: The bodily mutilation, the psychological trauma and finally the HIV-infection.

There is a formidable amount of education and care to be given, as fears cannot be treated with threats or punishment, but information and reassurance.

The Brotherhood of Blessed Gérard was recognised as a training institution for the practical training of Social Workers.

It is with pride and joy to share the news that we have been recognised as an institution for the practical training of Social Workers by the Fachhochschule (Specialised University) of Coburg, Germany. This is a special acknowledgement of the holistic approach to the social needs of the people in our comprehensive system of care. We expect the first student – Mr. Niklas Rohlff – for his 40-weeks practical training in September this year. He is already learning Zulu and waits for his study visa.

David Dempsey Dunn Was given ten days to live. His family had asked Blessed Gérard's Care Centre and Hospice to admit him, to spend his last days of life in the best possible care and enable him to have a dignified death.

But God had other plans for him -

His state of health improved day by day when he was in our care, so that after three weeks he was strong enough do undergo a life saving operation (amputation of both legs) in hospital and after some further days of recovery and rehabilitation in our centre he has gone home.

The medical staff at the hospital called him their "miracle baby". Call it what you like, it is indeed amazing, to see Mr. Dunn looking so well.

The family have requested that we, the Brotherhood of Blessed Gérard, help them to raise the funds needed to make Mr. Dunn not only well, but mobile again.

The funds will go towards buying Mr. Dunn a wheelchair. Should there be any balance, it will be used to reimburse Blessed Gérard's Care Centre and Hospice for the cost of three weeks of full-time intensive hospice care and various ambulance transports to and from Empangeni and Eshowe hospital. 
