Fr. Gérard had the opportunity to meet many of our German members and benefactors during his home leave late last year. Special highlights were his visits to Malteser-Hilfsdienst in Landsberg (Father Gérard was formerly their district commissioner), Caritas Homenursing Services of Schwandorf district (where he had helped establish their nursing training), Descartes High School in Neuburg (which is one of our most faithful benefactors through the consistent help of Mrs Albertine Sporer), Malteser-Hilfsdienst Regensburg (where Father was the Diocesan director of nursing), Malteser-Hilfsdienst München (where Dr. Albrecht Count of Rechberg and Mr Manfred Schulz keep their supporting hands under us), Malteser-Hilfsdienst Secretariate General in Cologne (where Father met Baron Heereman, who played a vital role in the acknowledgement of our organisation by the Order of Malta, Heinz Himmels and Peter Wittmann), St. Kilian's Parish in Mainhausen (where Father Michael Eich had arranged a meeting of all local members of our Brotherhood), St. George's Parish in Amberg (where Father met our member Father Werner Sulzer),

and last but not least to Father Gérard's father, brother and sister, who are all members of our Brotherhood (but of course, he enjoyed the family side of it too).

France

It was a special act of divine providence, that just at the time, when Father was in Germany, the Order of Malta organised a pilgrimage to Lourdes



Before Father came to Africa, he used to make an annual pilgrimage to Lourdes. Thus an old desire could be fulfilled again and he took his father with him as a gift to his 80th birthday, which he had celebrated in February last year.



When Father Gérard went to Rome, our faithful members Riccardo and Rosa De Stefano travelled 250 kilometres (140 miles) to the Grand Magistry of the Order of Malta, to collect Father and take him to visit the nice group of our members (which now number 20) in their home Solofra.

Their hospitality was unmatched. Riccardo and Rosa fulfilled another old wish of Father, to visit Amalfi and Scala. Amalfi is the place, where the merchants, who established the Benedictine Monastery St. Maria Latina in Jerusalem in AD 1048, came from. Their guesthouse was called the "Hospital of Jerusalem" and this became the historical cradle of the Order of Malta (which is actually called the Order of St. John of Jerusalem, of Rhodes and of Malta). The guestmaster of this Benedictine Monastery was Blessed Gérard, who founded a brotherhood to help him nurse the sick.



This brotherhood very soon developed into an independent religious order, being the Order of St. John of Jerusalem. There are two conflicting traditions as far as Blessed Gérard's home is concerned. The one assumes that he comes from the island of Martiques next to Marseilles in Southern France and gives him the surname "Tonque". The other theory calls Scala next to Amalfi his home and gives him the surname "del Sasso". The contemporary inhabitants of the little village Scala know little about the most famous of their sons.

However, they have named a local church youth group after him: Circolo "Gerardo Sasso".

It took us a long time, after following three conflicting directions, to get to the house called "Villa Saxo", which is believed to have been the seat of the "del Sasso" family. There is very little left of what could have withstood the destructive powers of history for more than 900 years.

In fact, the family living in the "Villa Saxo" pointed out to us. that the columns in the basement of the building would be the only remainder of the former splendour.









Another clue is the fact, that in a former church next to Amalfi Cathedral, which is now used as a museum, a fresco was found, which is also believed to show Blessed Gérard as a young knight. We know for sure, that in Blessed Gérard's times, the Order was purely and solely a hospital order without any military tasks. The fresco depicts Blessed Gérard wearing a sword. Maybe Blessed Gérard was posthumously granted such an attribute, as his Order had developed into a military order later.

As far as the history of the Maltese Cross is concerned, it is interesting to know, that it is part of the coat of arms of Amalfi. I have not yet found an answer to the question: "Since when did Amalfi have a Maltese Cross in it's coat of arms?" This would be to determine, whether the Order of Malta got the Maltese Cross from Amalfi or vice versa, Amalfi got it from the Order of Malta.



Ireland

Our Vice-President, Clare Kalkwarf, and her husband spent Christmastime with their children (Sean and Leon, the latter being a member of ours and the architect who designed our Care Centre) in London and (Heather, our new member) in Dublin. What surpasses familiy business is the fact, that they visited the Headquarters of the Irish Association and the Order of Malta Ambulance Corps (OMAC) in Dublin. They were warmly welcomed there and met the director of the OMAC, Frank Hearns, who had visited us in Mandeni last year. The OMAC donated us a set of neck braces (stiffnecks) and a sphygmomanometer. Mr. Hearns also promised to assist us in the further training of our volunteers. Clare and Geoff Kalkwarf stayed with Sr. Elaine Taylor, who had been with us in 1976/77 as a volunteer nurse at the Care Centre for a whole year. Sr. Elaine's state of health has improved tremendously after she had got severely ill during the second half of her stay in Mandeni. We will never forget what tremendous asset she has been for us by training the first volunteers for our Care Centre, our instructors and setting up a group of junior members (cadets).

England

This missal is bibliophilic treasure wonderfully illustrated with colour pictures of the Saints of our Order, including one of Blessed Gérard. We are most grateful and honoured to receive this most valuable gift.

News from our projects ..

Blessed Gérard's Care Centre & Hospice

has had a boost in activity through the management committee being invited to join the iSithebe AIDS Forum. This is a committee of factory managers, industrial nurses, shop stewards and volunteers from the factories in the local industrial area. The concern of this committee is the high incidence of people being found to be HIV positive (informed sources claim that 80% [!!!] of the work force in iSithebe factories could be HIVpositive), their ensuing deterioration into full-blown AIDS, finally resulting in the bording and/or death of factory personnel.

This forum was seeking help in the nursing and counselling of their own staff members. We, the team at Blessed Gerard's Care Centre, were approached to give advice and to look into the best manner in which we could help. The Care Centre hosted the last meeting of the iSithebe AIDS Forum, when it was decided that our facility would be ideal for the purpose of education, advice, home nursing and hospice care for all people and families affected by the HI Virus. Selected volunteers will be trained as AIDS counsellors along with other members of the iSithebe AIDS Forum.

The iSithebe AIDS Forum is also looking into the funding of the work done by our organisation in relation to the utilisation of our facility. They will canvass donations from their own companies as well as organising fund raising events in the local community.

We look forward with much anticipation to a good number of volunteers from the U.S.A. and Germany to join our local volunteers soon. The ones who will be coming definitively are Björn Peters from Germany from July 15th for a whole year and Katie Truesdale from the U.S.A. from July 17th for

a month. Most probably there will be two more nurses from the U.S.A., but we are not 100% sure at this stage. We look forward to your coming!

Blessed Gérard's AIDS Prevention Programme

will also be utilised more fully by the Isithebe AIDS Forum. Dr. PZT Thabethe, our medical superintendent, has been asked to organise our educational teams, to give seminars on AIDS in local factories.

Support has been received from the local paper factory, SAPPI Kraft, in the form of a donation of R5000 towards our AIDS education programme. On behalf of our entire executive, our members and all the people we assist, we would like to say thank you.

Blessed Gérard's Community Development Centre (Sewing School) is full once again. Miss Thulile Nzuza has excelled herself in her role as the teacher, maintaining a very high standard of sewing. During 1997 twelve ladies passed through our course. They began as unemployed people, with no means to earn an income. By the end of the year they had progressed from not knowing anything about being a seamstress, to being able to make lined skirts and jackets for ladies and trousers and collar shirts for men, as well as school uniforms, toddlers clothes and many other items which would be easy to market. We wish all the "graduates" the very best for the future.

Blessed Gérard's Bursary Fund

has once again been able to assist some worthy students to achieve a higher standard in education. In 1998 three young people will benefit from this fund. A young man who is a student at the M L Sultan Technikon in Durban, a young lady who is a student at the University of Zululand and a youth who is a pupil at a local high school. We wish them all the best in their quest for a better future and one day they will be in a position to help others, as they have been helped.

Blessed Gérard's Pre-primary School & Crèche

has been through some difficult times as a result of violence, unstable living conditions and uneployment in the surrounding areas. However, Miss Veronica Mthethwa, our teacher at the crèche, perseveres relentlessly. We congratulate her on her stability and concientiousness. The school is presently running at approximately 55% capacity, and we continue to advertise via word of mouth. We hope that this facility will be running at full capacity by mid 1998. We were able to buy a new set of three swings for the children at the crèche as well as many other small items.

Blessed Gérard's Feeding Scheme for Malnourished Infants

continues to run smoothly. Unfortunately we have more and more babies referred to us by the local doctors, clinics and social workers. I say "unfortunately", because it is a sad reflection on how needy our society really is. But, on the other hand, I say, "fortunately", because Sr. Nokuthula Thabethe and her team of volunteers are there on behalf of the Brotherhood of Blessed Gérard, to assist with the education of the mothers and the monitoring of the progress of the babies involved. At the moment we have more than 30 babies on our cards, which are brought, on a fortnightly basis, to be physically checked, weighed and supplied with enough infant formula milk powder and protein enriched porrige for two weeks consumption. This service is given completely free of charge. Should the children need more specialised or long term help, they would be referred to the relevant authorities, e.g. the social welfare department or a medical specialist or hospital.



Blessed Gérard's Friendship Club has begun a new era.

The members bade a sad but fond farewell to Mrs. Margaret Hawthorn, who had helped to plan and run the meetings during the last four years. Our active members, Mrs. Hawthorn together with Mrs. Yvonne Renaud and Mrs. Wendy Richardson were the initiators of this particular club, which meets fortnightly. It began as a senior citizens club, but has evolved into a true friendship club, with ladies of all ages coming together to assist and enjoy a morning of fun with the elderly. Mrs. Joyce Buss will continue to organise the

meetings and outings.

We would like to take this opportunity to express our very sincere and heartfelt gratitude to you, Margaret, for all the time and effort you put into making these meetings so enjoyable. May God bless you and your husband, Tom, in your retirement!
